Ted & Co is launching the premiere of their newest show, Discovery: A Comic Lament, in Harrisonburg on Saturday, June 24 at 7:30 pm at the Harrisonburg First Church of the Brethren, 315 S. Dogwood Dr. Admission is free, but please come considering how you might support this important project. Starring Ted Swartz and Michelle Milne, this play is about the Doctrine of Discovery, the legal framework that justifies theft of land and oppression of Indigenous Peoples. It finds unexpected humor at the crossroads of justice, land use, and Indigenous experience. A show about love, and loss of land, Discovery nudges us to question our stories with honesty and integrity. Created in partnership with the Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery Coalition, written by Alison Brookins, and directed by Phil Weaver-Stoesz.

Mennonite historian Ben Goossen will talk about his book, *Chosen Nation: Mennonites and Germany in a Global Era*, on Sunday, June 25, 7:00 p.m. at Park View Mennonite Church. Just released by Princeton University Press, *Chosen Nation* explores the how the global Mennonite church developed an uneasy relationship with Germany during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Despite the religion's origins in the Swiss and Dutch Reformation, as well as its longstanding pacifism, tens of thousands of members embraced militarist German nationalism. Chosen Nation is a sweeping history of this encounter and the debates it sparked among parliaments, dictatorships, and congregations across Eurasia and the Americas.

Conference Assembly begins on the evening of July 20 at 7 p.m. Saulo's passion to work with immigrants comes from his own experience as an immigrant and the biblical commandment to love the stranger. Now the US Immigration Education Coordinator for Mennonite Central Committee, he provides learning opportunities to constituents and the public about the need for better and safer mechanisms for people facing migration, the biblical call to welcome strangers, and advocates to reform the US immigration system. As part of his work, he coordinates immigration law trainings for non-profits offering immigration legal services to immigrant communities and leads learning tours to the U.S./Mexico borderlands for constituent and non-constituent groups. Born and raised in Guatemala for the first 15 years of his life, in 1986 he immigrated with his mother and siblings to Calgary, Alberta, to reunite with his father, who left Guatemala as a political refugee in 1980 during the internal conflict. Saulo lived in Calgary for 16 years, where he became a Canadian citizen. In 2001, he moved with his family to Goshen, Ind., to pursue studies at Goshen College. Goshen has been his home since then.
