Beyond Solar Panels: Tax Yourself For The Carbon You Use!

On July 9 installation of the CMC solar panel systems on the church sanctuary roof and on the Dean House will begin. Materials have already arrived as we saw in the service on July 5. The church has successfully raised all the funds needed to cover this project, through fifth Sunday offering, or through voluntary carbon tax funds. The voluntary carbon tax will continue to raise money for future green congregation projects and we encourage you to participate in this effort.

The voluntary carbon tax was an idea that originally rose with Ray Gingerich, and members of other churches, to address climate change in a way that the government has failed to do. Their idea was to raise money by taxing ourselves based on carbon use. The simplest of these ideas is to tax ourselves based on the gasoline we consume. The Green Congregation Committee has created some guidelines for this including a \$0.50 per gallon tax on gasoline (or propane), \$0.02 per mile of airline flight, \$2.86 per therm (1000 cubic feet) of natural gas, and \$0.022 per kilowatt-hour of electricity. As guidelines that are voluntary, you may use your own numbers for these taxes. The idea is to keep you aware of your own contribution to the problem of climate change.

Contributing your voluntary tax is easy. First, go to the voluntary carbon tax calculator (<https://www.sustainableclimatesolutions.org/carbon-tax-calculator-full/>) to estimate your voluntary carbon tax. Then contribute to CMC through any of the normal means (for instance, online), designating the gift as "voluntary carbon tax", or "green congregation committee."

We think of this fund as going beyond CMC. We would like to help others who want to reduce their own carbon footprint, especially those who do not have the financial resources to do this on their own. Some suggestions include funding a solar system on a Habitat for Humanity house and providing money for low-income households to insulate and tighten their housing envelope. If you have other ideas you would like us to consider, please pass them on to the committee, which includes Wayne Teel (chair), Brian Burkholder, Stefan Hess, Doug Graber Neufeld, Randy Reichenbach, David Shenk, and Kathy Yoder. We are especially interested in ideas that connect climate change and environmental justice.

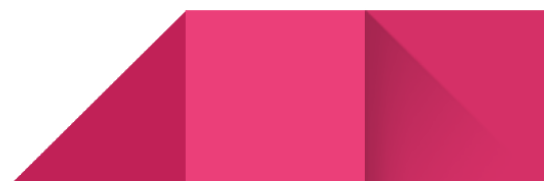

Reporting On An Apocalypse

"Apocalypse" [Gk: αποκάλυψις] a revelation/disclosure

CMC's Sunday school class, studying "Revelation" and lead by Reta Finger, has been a most helpful disclosure. For many, perhaps, the book of Revelation may often conjure up a reaction like: confusing, mysterious, convoluted, although its message is solid:

" . . . from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."

We used [Reta's blog](#), which covers the book of Revelation in 38 lessons, as a guide. No small task! Thanks, Reta for this amazing effort. Here are few of the key things that the study revealed, which were pivotal in getting a grasp on Revelation:

- understanding the literary genre of apocalyptic or revelatory writing
- the use of symbols and imagery
- telling the story of the vision in cycles, repeating and intensifying
- putting proper meaning into the use of numbers
- the writing is to *and* for 1st century Christians; therefore, the interpretation is in the first-century context. The people understood what John, the writer, was alluding to. (goodbye dispensationalists, goodbye millennialists)

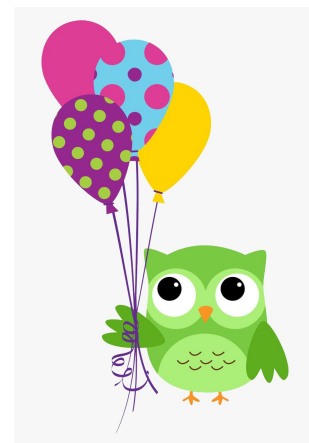
